MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

As 2018 has drawn to a close, it is clear that British Columbia had some successes on the global mineral exploration and mining stage. Preliminary numbers from Natural Resources Canada indicate that mineral exploration and deposit appraisal expenditures in BC increased for a second consecutive year. Provincial numbers for 2018 will be released at AME Roundup from our third annual “British Columbia Mineral and Coal Exploration Survey”. This survey is undertaken annually in partnership with EY and the Government of British Columbia’s Ministry of Energy, Mines & Petroleum Resources. Of course, one of the best indications of successful exploration is the opening of new mines, and Coeur Mining’s Silvertip high-grade silver-lead-zinc mine in Northwest BC began production in 2018. Congratulations to all involved in Coeur Mining’s achievement!

Throughout the year, AME has been active on various policy issues, and we are pleased that the importance of the industry has been recognized by the provincial government. In November, the BC legislative Select Standing Committee on Finance and Government Services recommended that the government review the province’s mineral exploration tax incentives with a view to making them the most competitive in Canada, and recommended increased staffing for natural resource permitting. Both recommendations had been put forward by AME in a presentation to the committee in October.

Access to land and water for mineral exploration continues to be a key issue for AME’s members, and the Association was active throughout the year in engagement sessions with the BC government on caribou recovery, and also continued to advocate for a permanent allowance to use water for low-impact, temporary mineral exploration activities. We will continue to work actively on those files into 2019.

The intersection of federal and provincial legislation is also of key importance, and at year’s end, AME is reviewing the new Provincial Environmental Assessment legislation. AME is optimistic that revised legislation will improve timelines and improve process predictability. However, the Association will continue to review the legislation as regulations are developed and implemented to ensure that BC’s project assessment process serves our industry while providing greater confidence the public. At this time, I thank the members of our committees, particularly the Land Access and Use, Indigenous Relations & Reconciliation, and Executive Committees, for providing invaluable input into our dialogue with government on this important topic.

Vancouver continues to be a global centre of excellence in the minerals and metals industry, with more than 800 exploration companies and 1,200 service and supply companies based in the city. AME is privileged to be able to tap into the talent that this vibrant industry, not only those people based in Vancouver but also those in cities and towns throughout BC, provides in supporting its advocacy work. It is also worth noting that the mineral exploration industry based in BC is active in nearly 100 countries around the world, and AME’s Mineral Exploration Roundup 2018 conference brought together more than 6,570 people from 39 countries in 2018. We expect to see similar, if not higher, numbers in 2019.

AME exists to represent our membership's interests, and it has been a pleasure to meet with many of you throughout the year to discuss your thoughts and ideas. Your input was key to the development and finalization of AME's 2018-2022 Strategic Plan. Thank you to all who contributed. And once again, I urge you to continue to provide your input by taking a moment at AME Roundup 2019 to participate in this year's member survey.

I have enjoyed the privilege of being the Chair of AME's Board of Directors and to work with AME staff and industry colleagues over the past year. I am proud of the work we have done together, and would like to thank my Executive and Board colleagues, our many volunteers and our staff for their efforts to support AME and our industry through lean times and to prepare it for the good times to come. Thank you for your support.

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT & CEO

On behalf of everyone at AME, I would first like to thank you for the opportunity to represent you, our vast and dynamic membership, through a time of change and progress.

In January 2018, AME hosted its highest net revenue Roundup conference ever. Over 6,500 delegates enjoyed tried and true events such as BC Night and an excellent array of short courses and technical sessions. In addition, new events such as the Reconciliation Breakfast, the Innovation Hub and the Project Generators Hub were introduced with great success. We saw 238 pieces of editorial coverage and event listings were published in both traditional and social media, with a total reach of 124,535,233. This was an increase of 16 percent over 2017. Based on a poll of 743 respondents, 95% of attendees agreed the event was valuable overall.



Beyond Roundup 2018, AME participated in multiple engagement and consultation sessions on both Provincial and Federal legislative and regulatory changes. In addition, AME was represented on the Environmental Assessment Advisory Committee to Minister of Environment, George Heyman as well as participating as a member of the Mining Jobs Task Force, an initiative of the Ministry of Energy, Mines and Petroleum Resources. Through a unique and strategic collaboration with AME, the Province, the Tahltan Central Government, the Nisga'a Nation and several exploration companies working in Northwestern B.C., a pilot initiative was started called the B.C. Regional Mining Alliance (BCRMA). Established early in 2018 and initially focused on Northwestern BC, the BCRMA represents key projects specifically in the "Golden Triangle." The BCRMA promotes B.C. as Canada's leading exploration and mining jurisdiction for investment. Invited companies must be AME Corporate Members and as of August 2018 included Dolly Varden Silver Corp., GT Gold Corp., IDM Mining and Skeena Resources Ltd.

The advocacy work of AME in 2018 was not without its challenges. There are a number of interconnected mandates within the four provincial government ministries most relevant to AME: Ministry of Energy, Mines and Petroleum Resources, Ministry of Environment and Climate Change Strategy, Ministry of Indigenous Relations and Reconciliation and the Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development. Most prevalent and shared between ministries is the responsibility to forward reconciliation with Indigenous people as well as to implement the principles of the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples through updated government policy, regulation and legislation. AME has focused on seeking clarity and transparency between ministries on the scope, timing and level of change of key initiatives such as the Environmental Assessment Act revitalization, the Professional Reliance review as well as new endangered species legislation and a province-wide wildlife strategy. Beginning stages of consultation on modernizing land use planning are also in progress. AME has actively and collaboratively participated in these initiatives in order to support advancement of these important changes, while encouraging thoughtful consideration to benefits and consequences to the industry of any proposed changes.

While advocating for the industry alongside our partners at the Mining Association of British Columbia, the AME staff, with the dedicated efforts of our talented, experienced and passionate volunteers, delivered critical components of the 2017-2018 Annual Work Plan. We developed a new 2018-2022 Strategic Plan, and based on that, the 2018-2019 Annual Work Plan was created with input from members, committees, staff and the Board of Directors in order to prepare for opportunities we anticipate emerging through positive trends such as somewhat increasing commodity prices as well as the broader support in moving to a low-carbon future and the increased need of sustainably-sourced minerals and metals to do so. Successful mineral exploration requires a collaborative approach and with these opportunities ahead of us, there is no better time to showcase our standards, practices

and expertise in British Columbia. Beyond advocacy, communication and awareness, member benefits and service to our members remain priorities for AME.

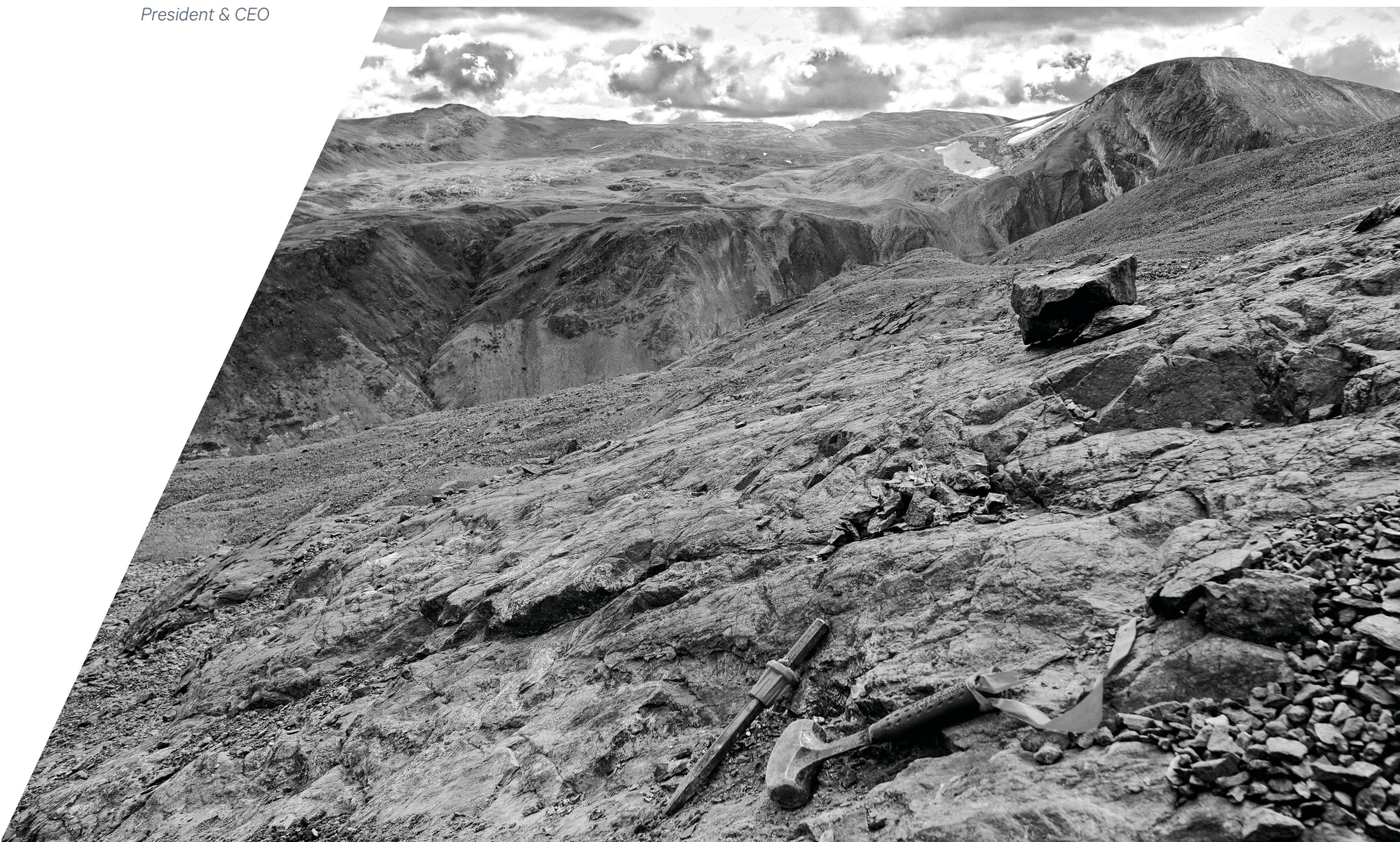

PROGRESS IN 2018

SUCCESSFUL EXPLORATION

SUCCESSFUL PROJECTS ARE DEVELOPED EXPEDIENTLY FOR THE BENEFIT OF ALL BRITISH COLUMBIANS MAKING BC THE MOST FAVOURED JURISDICTION IN CANADA FOR MINERAL EXPLORATION AND DEVELOPMENT.

Goals:

Maintain access to the current land base;
Increase regulatory predictability;
Increase economic viability and confidence;
Integrate social responsibility; and
Promote relevant and useful geoscience.

2018 highlights include:

- Welcomed Dr. Robert Stevens, P.Geo. to the staff as the new Vice President, Regulatory and Technical Policy.
- Attended the Union of BC Municipalities (UBCM) annual meeting from September 11 to 13. AME's President and CEO moderated a panel at the Mining Breakfast, hosted by C3 Alliance.
- Participated on the BC Mining Jobs Task Force that met throughout the summer and fall of 2018. The aim of the task force is to provide recommendations to government that will make BC the most attractive jurisdiction in Canada for investment in mineral exploration and mining. AME advocated for a number of measures that would support investment in mineral exploration. Implementation of actions is expected to begin in 2019.
- Actively participated in the environmental assessment act review process by participating on the Advisory committee to Minister Heyman. A

new Environmental Assessment Act was tabled in the Legislature on November 5 as was passed and received Royal Assent on November 27; regulations and policies will be developed in 2019 with implementation in the fall of 2019.

- Submitted papers on the Professional Reliance Review. The Professional Governance Act was tabled on October 22 and received Royal Assent on November 27.
- Actively involved in engagement on a proposed caribou agreement between the province and federal government under section 11 of the federal Species at Risk Act. This is still pending.
- Participated in consultation regarding provincial species-at-risk legislation. This file is likely to be reinvigorated in the first half of 2019.
- Engaged and commented on a permanent allowance for mineral exploration under the Water Sustainability Act. The current temporary allowance has been extended through December 31, 2019, to allow time for the permanent exemption to be reviewed and a decision rendered.
- Continued advocacy and engagement on permitting and Notices of Work, and planning a high-level meeting during Roundup 2019 to plan for Notice of Work workshops in the regions in the spring of 2019.

2018 Highlights include:

- Incorporated the eight regional exploration groups into the strategic communications planning and budget. The 2018-2019 Regional Exploration Group Outreach funding was confirmed and distributed in September 2018.
- Roundup 2018 media coverage received 238 pieces of editorial coverage published in both traditional and social media, with a total reach of 124,535,233. this was an increase of 16 percent over 2017.
- Discovery Day, a family-friendly event at AME Roundup is open to the public.

- Formation and participation of the BC Regional Mining Alliance (BCRMA), in partnership with the Tahltan Central Government, the Nisga'a Lisims Government, the Ministry of Energy, Mines and Petroleum Resources and several exploration companies.
- Successful and fun annual Golf Tournament in May.
- Released the 2017 British Columbia Mineral and Coal Exploration survey, delivered through partnership with EY and the Ministry of Energy, Mines and Petroleum Resources. In 2017, we saw the first increase in expenditures since 2012 and hope to continue that upward trend! Keep an eye on your email in early October for a link to complete the survey.
- As of December 2018, AME had 394 Corporate Members and 4470 Individual Members.
- Events to connect members included the annual Charity Golf Tournament in May, Old Timers summer lunch in July and Past Presidents and Chairs annual lunch in October and our annual Open House in November.
- AME also kept members up-to-date on AME's advocacy work through the quarterly issues of the quarterly Mineral Exploration magazine, monthly blog online articles and the AME e-News.
- Member survey conducted with an 11.3% response rate or 743 responses; a summary of the survey was release to all members in spring of 2018.
- Three environment, health and safety workshops reaching 78 registrants ranging from high school and university students through exploration managers in Vancouver, at UBC and at Minerals North in Houston.
- Collaborated with PDAC on the 13th annual national environment, health and safety survey – confirming that mineral exploration continues to be safer than most industries and continuing to inform AME resources.
- Began development of a web-based Risk Management training module for completion by mid-2019.

2018 highlights include:

The AME Roundup conference held every January during the BC government's annually proclaimed Mineral Exploration Week is AME's signature membership outreach event and primary source of revenue.

Highlights of the 35th Annual AME Roundup Conference 2018, "New Generation of Discovery," include the following:

- Successful temporary move over the Vancouver Convention Centre West with more than 6,570 attendees from 39 countries.
- Leading up to the conference were a full slate of short courses including the structural geology of Canadian ore deposits, and the geology of zinc deposits and geometallurgy for geologists.
- 150 students attended the Student Industry Networking Event connecting industry leaders and the next generation of mineral explorers and geoscientists.
- The Innovation Hub showcased the re-imagining of the industry and how it is moving into the 21st century and saw press coverage from Fairchild TV and the Vancouver Sun.
- A continuation of our foundational programming in the Core Shack, Technical Sessions and Student Poster Session.
- Technical Sessions including the themed session "Think Zinc!" examining increased zinc prices having generated significant market interest and exploration activity surrounding this important base metal.
- The Awards Gala was another successful event starting with a touching and hopeful opening address from OVCARE to raise awareness and support for ovarian cancer prevention. This was followed by an evening celebrating the successes of numerous worthy nominees and final award recipients in eight diverse categories. In total, \$43,750 was raised for OVCARE during Roundup.
- Sold-out Exhibit Hall, Core Shack and Prospectors' Tent displays.
- The Reconciliation Breakfast with Chief Dr. Robert Joseph and Karen Joseph. This event inspired and sponsored by Teck Resources Limited. This event was picked up by CBC and the coverage is estimated to have reached an audience of 15 million.
- A remarkable 11.3% or 743 responses to our membership survey during Roundup.
- A well-attended Discovery Day family-friendly public outreach event.
- Geoscience BC's release of results from its Search Phase III Project – an airborne minerals survey of north central and northeastern BC. This data will highlight where deposits of metals like copper may be with more accuracy than ever before. This will help communities, First Nations, the exploration sector and governments to plan future land use and to attract investment.
- Presentations from notable government, industry, and Indigenous leaders including The Honourable Michelle Mungall, BC Ministry of Energy, Mines and Petroleum Resources; Honourable Doug Donaldson, BC Ministry of Forests, Lands, Natural Resource; Honourable Scott Fraser, BC Ministry of Indigenous Relations and Reconciliation; Honourable George Heyman, BC Ministry of Environment and Climate Change Strategy; Kelvin Dushnisky, President, Barrick Gold Corporation; Alex Christopher, Senior Vice President, Exploration, Projects & Technical Services, Teck Resources Limited; Chief Dr. Robert Joseph, O.B.C., O.C.; Chief Joe Alphonse, Tl'etinqox (Anaham) Nation - Tsilhqot'in National Government member nation; Chief Michael Archie, Canim Lake Band; Chief Don Harris, Xa'xtsa Nation, Lower St'at'imc Tribal Council.

TREASURER'S REPORT ON BEHALF OF AME'S FINANCE AND AUDIT COMMITTEE



Members of AME's Finance and Audit Committee review, on behalf of the Board of Directors, the preparation of the annual operating budget and the quarterly and annual financial statements, as well as our returns on investment assets and other related matters.

Our financial results for the fiscal year reflected an operating surplus of almost \$684,000 compared to a deficit of \$219,000 in 2017. Our 2019 operating budget as initially approved was balanced, and no use of any operating surplus carry forward was planned. However, based on the fiscal 2018 results subsequent to August 31, 2018 the board elected to approve additional net spending, both current and capital, of approximately \$435,000 and to further restrict \$300,000 of this surplus within equity. This deliberate, multi-year approach to financial management is preferable, in my view, to hurried and arbitrary spending at year end in order to 'use up' the operating surplus generated in a particular year. Of course, formal accounting and reporting standards generally require the preparation of financial statements on an annual basis. However, it is unwise for us, in the context of our history, continuity and ongoing mission, to over-emphasize the importance of the financial surplus or deficit of any particular twelve month fiscal period.

Internally-restricted net assets, after the \$300,000 allocation above, are, subsequent to year end, \$2.5 million. By way of comparison, at August 31, 2003, shortly before I became Treasurer and immediately subsequent to the sale of our building on Hastings Street, our net assets were approximately \$2,164,000. When we first formally 'restricted' the use of a portion of our net assets in 2007, that initial restricted amount was \$3.0 million. In general our net assets have fluctuated between approximately \$2.2 and \$3.2 million over the past 15 years. In some years we have had a surplus, in others we have used the reserve mechanism to finance an operating deficit; always the emphasis from my perspective has been on the maintenance of stability, in a sector generally ripe with volatility and unpredictability, over the long term. The truth is that our costs, for example of staffing an office in Vancouver, are high and are not likely to decrease going forward, while at the same time same time the need to represent and advocate for our sector has probably never been greater. It costs money to do things, and we should always try to do as much as possible for members in all regions of the province, subject to our financial resources over time.

Our financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles applicable to not-for-profit organizations and reflect, in certain areas, management's best estimates based on information currently available. AME has developed and is maintaining a system of internal controls designed to provide

reasonable assurance that its assets are safeguarded, transactions are authorized, and financial information is reliable.

The following summary annual financial statements have been prepared by, and are the responsibility of, myself in consultation with our senior management. They faithfully reflect and represent what we believe to be the most relevant elements of the full version of the audited financial statements, which are, as always, the responsibility of both the Board and myself. Our external auditors are PricewaterhouseCoopers LLP, and their report which follows outlines the scope of their examination and unqualified opinion on these summary financial statements.

Finally, on a personal note, after 15 years this is my last annual report as AME's Treasurer. I should like to thank our past and present staff, and in particular Patricia Morrison, for all of their hard work in support of myself and the committee. I have also served with many dedicated volunteers on the Finance and Executive committees, many of whom I now consider to be friends, and I have learned a great deal in working with them. Professionally, my business operates primarily within this industry full of hard-working, talented people who are engaged in honourable and important endeavours, usually against long odds, with scarce resources, and often without widespread understanding or acknowledgment from the general public. And certainly, like many professionals in Vancouver, I am indebted to them for a great deal of whatever personal and business success I have achieved. AME must continue to speak out, strongly and publicly, for the collective interests of these people, its members, and having done what I could in this role in furtherance of that cause has been my privilege.
