MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

It has been a tumultuous year of change for explorers in BC. The crash in commodities and capital markets, with the rapid global spread of the COVID-19 pandemic quickly rebounded. Gold prices achieved record highs midway through 2020 and along with resurgent silver, copper and other commodities, junior companies share prices surged and capital markets opened, allowing for BC explorers to fill their coffers and get to work. Other jurisdictions saw similar rebounds; however, our province was certainly one of the most popular locations on the planet for explorers from grassroots through to advanced-stage projects.

During the spring of 2020, concern and uncertainty was understandably widespread; I would like to commend AME's CEO Kendra Johnston for her strong and steady leadership. The Association was a first mover in developing and distributing COVID-19 safety protocols. Most of our work is socially-distanced in rural and remote areas, however the potential for spreading the virus within camp environments or to small communities, particularly to Indigenous people, has been of critical concern. As of this writing, our industry's track record through the crisis has been excellent. This has been a great example of the way our industry prioritizes health and safety for our teams and local communities.

I am excited for the future of the mining industry, with hopes of renewed mining in the short to medium-term at past producers such as Eskay Creek, Bralorne, Premier, Barkerville, Kemess, Scottie and Dolly Varden. It is also exciting to see progress at large projects with significant metal endowment like Blackwater, Galore Creek and Treaty Creek. The jobs and business opportunities at these deposits through exploration, development, operation and closure - particularly to rural British Columbians and First Nations - is and will be significant.

The COVID-19 pandemic introduced another major challenge to AME: a significant threat to the Association's operating revenue. This required significant and difficult managerial decisions, including having to make staff cuts. Additionally, the transition to a virtual conference with significantly reduced revenue has made the importance of sponsorship by Corporate Members even more important. I am proud of the diligence and leadership over the past year by the AME Board, staff and the Roundup Organizing Committee as they researched, planned and implemented these timely and important changes.

Our tradition of coming together at the end of January for Roundup will certainly be different in 2021, but I believe that the change to a virtual component will become permanent and we will embrace the opportunity to reach more explorers and stakeholders both at home in British Columbia, particularly in rural communities, as well as around the world.

Societal change continues to drive the evolution of our industry. From increased awareness of systemic racism through the Black Lives Movement to the provincial acceptance of UNDRIP, ESG components have become the most important consideration to investors and financiers of natural resource companies, large and small. I believe that AME continues to be a leader amongst exploration and mining associations in these progressive movements.

Our provincial NDP government changed from minority to majority during the fall of 2020. During their first term, we are grateful for their commitment to responsible mineral exploration and an inclusive permitting process driven by science and consultation. We look forward to further implementations of the Mining Jobs Task Force action items and to further progress in clearing the permitting backlogs faced by many of our members over the next year.

Finally, I am reaching the end of my tenure as the Chair for AME. It has been a privilege to serve you, our Members. Many thanks to the Executive Committee and particularly to Vice-Chairs Jill Tsolinas and Tara Hassan, to our diverse and outstanding Board of Directors and to the outstanding staff of AME, particularly CEO Johnston.

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT & CEO

On behalf of everyone at AME, I would first like to congratulate each of you for making it through a challenging 2020 and thank you for your patience and understanding as we have found new ways to provide services to you in this time of change.



In January 2020, AME hosted a successful Roundup conference. More than 6,000 delegates enjoyed networking events and an excellent array of technical information from short courses and technical sessions to the Core Shack and Prospectors' Tent. In addition, we held the third annual Reconciliation Breakfast, hosted a variety of cutting-edge exhibitors in the Innovation Hub and new exploration projects in the Project Generators Hub. We created lots of media buzz and earned coverage for AME, Roundup, Discovery Day, and the B.C. Regional Mining Alliance with a total reach of 147 million impressions.

In March, COVID-19 hit, impacting the rest of the year. AME worked closely with the provincial government, successfully advocating for mineral exploration to be recognized as an essential service, for an extension to all Notice of Work Permits and an extension of time to complete required exploration expenditures to December 31, 2021, and finally to expedite the return of outstanding Mineral Exploration Tax Credit rebates, putting money back in your pocket in time for field season. Working closely with our friends at PDAC, we also advocated for a year-long extension to the deadline for spending flow-through funds raised in 2019 and 2020.

As field season approached, so did the new challenges of conducting field work in a COVID-19 environment. AME, working with the Public Health Officers and government staff, developed guidance for working in small camps and for interacting with local partners. Your efforts to follow these orders contributed to everyone having a safe and successful field season. Thank you to all of you for taking these measures seriously and for implementing controls at your project sites that were beyond the requirements.

In July, AME had to make some difficult operational and financial decisions resulting in valued members of our team being let go due to COVID-19. I'd like to thank those staff for their contribution and efforts throughout their time at AME and thank the remaining staff who have dealt with a great deal of change over the past year, and who have gone above and beyond to make sure we are providing our members with the information and services you need.

During the summer months, our staff and Board contemplated the various options for bringing you Roundup 2021, and we were encouraged by the great response to the webinars and events that we hosted online starting in the spring. As you now know, Roundup 2021 will be virtual, but all of our sessions and programming that you are used to seeing at Roundup will still be available. We heard from membership that what was most important was the ability to network, connect and engage, so we have worked hard to bring you a virtual platform that will allow us all to interact with each other and with the content being presented.

In the fall, a new majority NDP government was elected, and Minister Ralston was appointed Minister of Energy Mines and Low Carbon Innovation. AME congratulates all MLAs and Ministers on their appointments, and looks forward to working with each of you as we continue to advocate for the protection and promotion of mineral exploration and development.

We are looking forward to seeing you at Roundup 2021, to hearing what you've been up to, what your challenges are, and where you see potential opportunities. Please take the time to stop by the AME booth and give us your feedback; our job is to serve you, our membership and the more feedback you can give us, the better we can serve you.

In closing, please accept my heartfelt thanks to the amazing volunteers, Board and Executive Committee and staff. The Association has a strong, credible and important voice because of each of you.

PROGRESS IN 2020

SUCCESSFUL EXPLORATION

SUCCESSFUL PROJECTS ARE DEVELOPED EXPEDIENTLY FOR THE BENEFIT OF ALL BRITISH COLUMBIANS MAKING BC THE MOST FAVOURED JURISDICTION IN CANADA FOR MINERAL EXPLORATION AND DEVELOPMENT.

Goals:

- Maintain access to the current land base;
- Increase regulatory predictability;

- Integrate social responsibility;
- Promote relevant and useful geoscience.

2020 highlights include:

Collaborated with provincial government on a swift response to the COVID-19 pandemic. Measures put in place by the provincial government included the following:

- Extending all existing Notice of Work (NoW) Permits through December 31, 2021
- Extending the deadline for required exploration expenditures on mineral claims to December 31, 2021
- Refunding all outstanding BC Mining Exploration Tax Credit (BC METC) rebates to companies

AME continues to advocate for the following additional measures:

- Increase the BC Flow-Through Share rate and the BC METC rates to 35% and 30% respectively
- Expand the criteria for the use of flow-through and BC METC funds to include administration and desktop geological work
- Create an Investment Fund for Mineral Exploration
- Reinstate the Prospector Grant
- Increased funding for the BC Geological survey

Other activities AME has participated in throughout the year include:

- Worked with industry organizations nationwide on a federal response to the COVID-19 pandemic resulting in a deadline extension of 12 months for spending flow-through funds raised in 2019 and 2020.
- Worked closely with the provincial government and the Public Health Officers on new guidance documents for operating camps safely during COVID-19.
- Actively participated on the Steering Committee for the provinces Mines Standardization & Service Improvement Project.

PUBLIC AWARENESS AND STAKEHOLDER EDUCATION

PREDICTABLE PUBLIC SUPPORT THROUGH INFORMED AND COLLABORATIVE DIALOGUE.

Goals:

- Create and leverage partnerships;
- Build on marketing and communication expertise of members; and
- Expand audience outside of the industry.

2020 Highlights include:

- **Funded seven regional exploration groups** for public outreach and education activities. This initiative is in its tenth successful year, and largely moved to a virtual format in 2020.
- **Generated extensive Roundup media** for 2020. There was a total of 878 pieces of editorial coverage, newswire reposts, and event listings with a total reach of more than 149 million impressions.
- **Partnered with industry on the #MiningFeedsBC challenge.** AME partnered with Integra Resources on a drive to raise money for food banks across BC in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic. The initiative raised \$100,000 – quadrupling the original goal of \$25,000, largely thanks to the participation of Wheaton Precious Metals.
- **Hosted Discovery Day**, a free family-friendly event at Roundup, open to the public. 94 Event Listings posted on various conference, news and online platform sites and we received a total of 17 pieces of editorial coverage and event listings with a total reach of more than 3 million impressions and 3-broadcast interviews including Yukon Dan on Global BC Weekend Morning and Steve Irwin and Danielle Mountjoy on leading Chinese broadcaster Fairchild TV.

- **During BC Mining Month**, AME collaborated with MineralsEd to produce educational videos to teach the public about minerals, mining, our natural environment and the role they play in our everyday lives. Videos discussed the relationship between mineral exploration and The Port of Vancouver and natural environments including fossils, glaciers, mountains and tides.

- **MineralsEd and Britannia Mine Museum** were the recipients of AME's Outreach Education Fund for 2020 to support their well-established Education Programs related to mineral exploration and development.

- Continue to participate in the **Wet'suwet'en Regional Engagement Group**.
- **Supported First Nation partners** throughout the province by providing guidance and encouragement to our members to protect local communities from COVID-19.

 - Environment, Social and Governance webinars in April and November
 - Health & Safety workshop in April
 - Digital Marketing workshop in October
 - Big Data and Machine Learning webinar in December
- **Held the second annual AME MinEx Talks** in October.
- **Released four tools to support members, particularly in early-stage exploration:**
 - Indigenous Engagement Guidebook
 - Early Engagement Planning Tool
 - A Mineral Explorer's Guide to Resource Roads
 - Reclamation for Mineral Exploration
- **Released two final issues of the print Mineral Exploration magazine and began transition to an online model.** The print magazine served AME members for 40 years; fittingly, one of its proponents – then president Donald Mustard – was profiled in the Winter 2020 issue.
- **Continued the monthly blog online and AME e-News** to keep members up to date on AME's advocacy work and industry stories.
- **Created and maintained a dedicated COVID-19 webpage** to serve as a hub of information for members on policy updates, announcements and guidelines.
- **Collaborated with PDAC and the Canadian Diamond Drilling Association on the 15th annual national environment, health and safety survey** – confirming that mineral exploration continues to be safer than most industries and continuing to inform AME resources.
- **Continued the AME Mentorship Program for a second year with 21 Mentor/Mentee participants.**
- **Launched the AME Job Board**, a place for industry to post the roles they need filled and those who are underemployed to post their skills.

Highlights of the 37th Annual AME Roundup Conference 2020, “Lens on Discovery,” include:

- **Successfully hosted more than 6,500 attendees from 49 countries** “under the sails” at the Vancouver Convention Centre East.

- **Six short courses** we offered to build knowledge and provide opportunities for professional development for our members.

- **150 students attended the Student Industry Networking Event** connecting industry leaders and the next generation of mineral explorers and geoscientists.

- There were three days of presentations on the **Innovation Stage** each focused on geoscience, geophysics and social innovation.

- **The Core Shack, Technical Sessions and Student Poster Session** Continue to be a highlight of the conference and our foundational programming.

- **Technical Sessions** including the themed session “**Seeing the Unseeable**” which showcased how new ways to see ore systems undercover, at depth or from their cryptic expressions on the surface can improve drilling success.

- **The Awards Gala** where AME proudly recognized the remarkable achievements and contributions of individuals and teams in the mineral resource, investment, and mineral exploration industry. This sold-out event celebrated the successes of numerous worthy nominees and final award recipients in eight diverse categories.

- **The Exhibit Hall, Core Shack, Project Generators Hub and Prospectors’ Tent** displays sold-out.

- **The Reconciliation Breakfast** focused on how leaders can enable a culture of reconciliation and featured remarks from Karen Joseph, CEO of Reconciliation Canada and Chief Willie Littlechild, Commissioner, Truth and Reconciliation Commission; the event is inspired and sponsored by Teck Resources Limited.

- **Discovery Day**, a family-friendly public outreach event, was well-attended and is quickly becoming an annual event for many rock-hounding families.

- **Presentations from notable government, industry, and First Nations speakers** including the Honourable Michelle Mungall and Honourable Bruce Ralston, successive ministers of Energy, Mines and Petroleum Resources; Honourable Scott Fraser, B.C. Ministry of Indigenous Relations and Reconciliation; Honourable George Heyman, B.C. Ministry of Environment and Climate Change Strategy; Paul Lefebvre, MP, Sudbury and Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of Natural Resources Canada; Chief Ian Campbell, Squamish Nation; Fraser MacCorquodale, GM Exploration, Newcrest Mining Limited; Blair Lekstrom, Dawson Creek City Councillor; Vaughn Palmer, Provincial Political Columnist, Vancouver Sun; Joseph Ovsenek, President & CEO, Pretium Resources Inc.; Matt Dugaro, Executive Director, Investment Banking, CIBC; Haytham Hodaly, Senior Vice President, Corporate Development, Wheaton Precious Metals; Gabrielle Herle, Safety Coordinator, Chinook Scaffold Systems Ltd.

As of December 2020, final preparations were being made for AME Remote Roundup 2021, “**Leading Through Change**” the virtual debut of the annual AME Roundup conference due to the global pandemic.

2020 TREASURER'S REPORT ON BEHALF OF AME'S FINANCE AND AUDIT COMMITTEE



Members of AME's Finance and Audit Committee review, on behalf of the Board of Directors, the preparation of the annual operating budget and the quarterly and annual financial statements, as well as our returns on investment assets and other related matters.

Our financial results for the fiscal year reflected an operating surplus of \$47,898 compared to a surplus of \$683,711 in 2019. While the approved budget at the beginning of fiscal 2020 was intended to go into a deficit using surplus from the General Fund, with the onset of COVID-19, there was a reduction in operations and related spending. Included in the financial statements is also the Board's decision, on the recommendation of management and the Finance and Audit Committee, to transfer \$250,000 from the Contingency Reserve Fund ("CRF") to the General Fund as of August 31, 2020 as a buffer against continued impacts of COVID-19. The transfer was made pursuant to the provisions of our Bylaws, which allow a maximum transfer of 10% of the opening balance of the CRF, which was \$2,500,000 as of September 1, 2019.

While AME had a very successful annual conference in January 2020, the subsequent impact of a global pandemic created, and continues to create, significant uncertainties. The most significant impact on AME to date is that its annual conference for January 2021 will be moving to a virtual format. This virtual format will have less fixed costs but is also expecting less revenues; and more specifically, the timing of the related revenues is difficult to predict in these unprecedented times. AME's approach to budgeting and its operations has consistently been with a long-term lens as supports the industry, and the CRF is critical to AME's long term planning. The CRF was created, in part, to provide stability so that AME can consistently support the industry and maintain its critical advocacy activities while weathering the natural cycles of the greater economy. As of the date of this letter, AME cannot predict the format of its 2022 annual conference and the related timing of its revenues and sponsorships. Accordingly, for this year's annual general meeting, the Board is asking membership to temporarily ease the bylaws around the CRF, such that AME has the ability to manage any potential timing differences in the receipt of revenues and outflows of expenses. The CRF was created to be a buffer in extraordinary circumstances and such permission can only be granted by the members, which would typically be conducted once a year, concurrent with the annual conference. The Board and management are committed to funding ongoing operations from the General Fund over the long term and to restoring withdrawals from the CRF, and continuing to operate a balanced budget.

Our financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles applicable to not-for-profit organizations and reflect, in certain areas, management's best estimates based on information currently available. AME has developed and is maintaining a system of internal controls designed to provide reasonable assurance that its assets are safeguarded, transactions are authorized, and financial information is reliable.

The following summary annual financial statements have been prepared by, and are the responsibility of, myself in consultation with our senior management. They faithfully reflect and represent what we believe to be the most relevant elements of the full version of the audited financial statements, which are, as always, the responsibility of both the Board and myself. Our external auditors are PricewaterhouseCoopers LLP, and their report which follows outlines the scope of their examination and unqualified opinion on these summary financial statements.

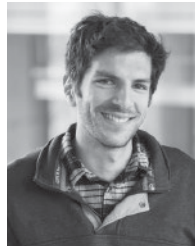

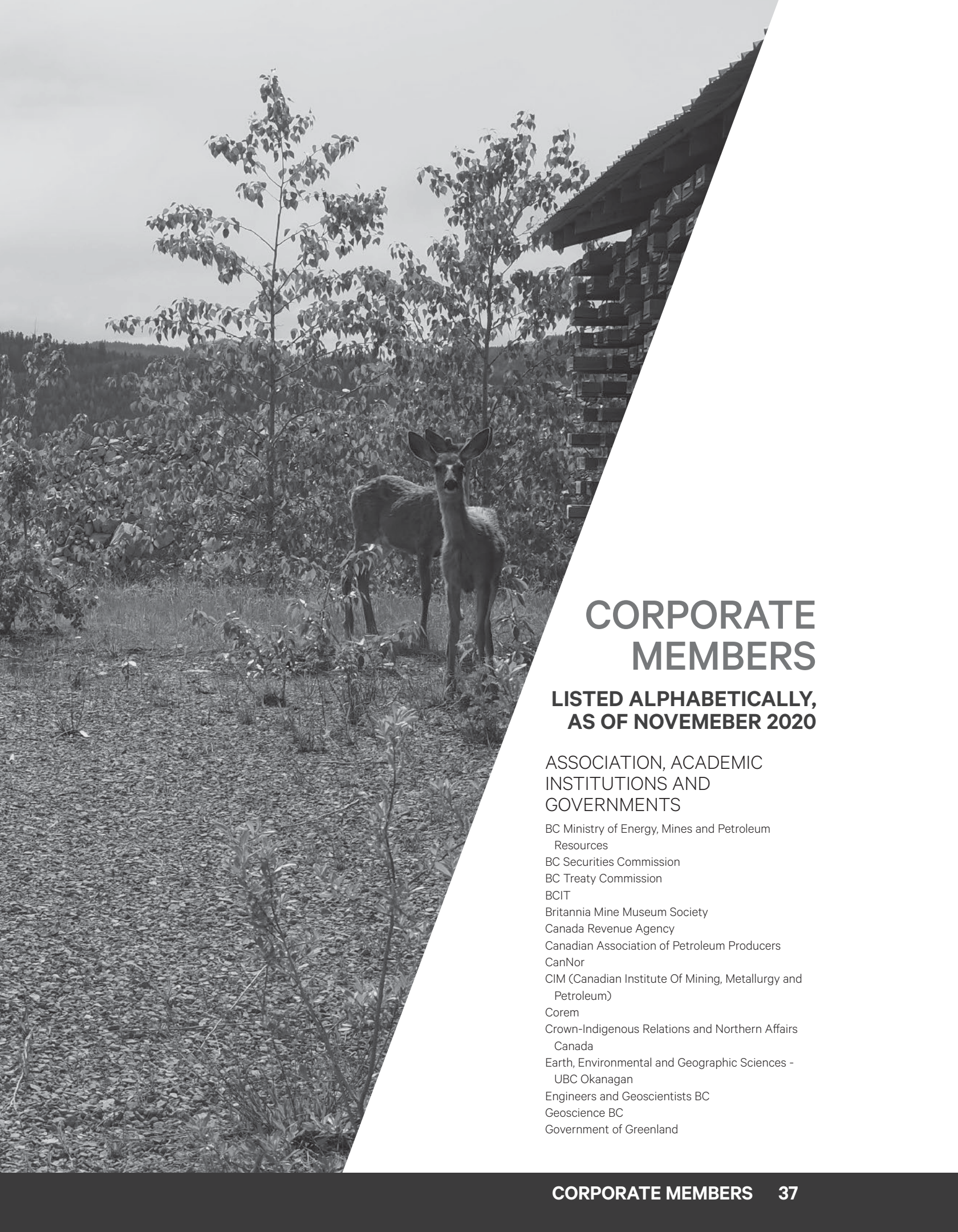
